Greetings from historic Peterboro! Have you noticed how much publicity Peterboro has been getting in the local newspapers? We have a very special person that's responsible for most of the activity. And keep your eyes open, because we've got some big things in the works. But we need help!! We are in desperate need of some additional members on the SCA board. ### **Building Updates**

#### • **Community Center**

- After a couple of years working on the interior, the building is looking great inside. But the outside paint has begun to weather again, so this summer the S.C.A. will be getting the exterior of the building painted.
- Our group purchased a new refrigerator for the kitchen, to replace the one that died.

- The Town of Smithfield had the Peterboro Area Museum painted last summer; there were some additional costs of \$250 that the S.C.A. covered.

#### • **Land Office**

- Our big project this year was getting the plaster restored. The hard part was finding a plasterer who was able to restore this historic building. Maybe some of you had a chance to see it during the Civil War Weekend. We are waiting on the baseboards, then some more plaster work and then to finish painting.

### **Community Activity**

The big news around Peterboro is the creation of an **Abolition Hall of Fame**; it was announced publicly for the first time by Assemblyman Bill Magee at the opening ceremonies of the 12<sup>th</sup> annual Civil War. The New York State Antislavery Society held its inaugural Meeting in Peterboro, October 22, 1835. From that event until his death in 1874, wealthy landowner Gerrit Smith was devoted to freedom for the slaves. In those forty years of anti-slavery activities, an honor roll of abolitionists of national prominence came to the Town of Smithfield to speak at the Free Church of Peterboro and to stay in Smith's mansion. In 2001 the United States Department of Interior designated the Gerrit Smith Estate as a National Historic Landmark because it "was found to possess national significance in the history of the United States." Therefore, it is fitting that an Abolition Hall of Fame be created in Peterboro that honors abolitionists, provides the public the opportunity to understand these people and the times in which they worked, and to study models of reform that address human rights issues for this century. The goal of the Abolition Hall of Fame will be to annually induct one person from the 19<sup>th</sup>, 20<sup>th</sup>, and 21<sup>st</sup> century that demonstrated (or demonstrates) commitment to abolition.

On June 19, 2004 Governor George Pataki signed into legislation a new Underground Railroad Heritage Trail. There were two sites in Madison County and they were both in Peterboro, the Gerrit Smith Estate and the Smithfield Community Center. Pataki released a statement saying, "New York has always been a trailblazer in ensuring civil rights and freedom, and its communities played a role in a struggle for human liberty in American history- the fight for the end of slavery." Inclusion on the historic trail makes Peterboro eligible for State and Federal grant money.

## Civil War Weekend

- The 12<sup>th</sup> annual Civil War Weekend was a great success! Our thanks go out to the members of the Civil War committees and all the dedicated volunteers who help in many ways to support the event. What a wonderful community effort for a good cause.
